This course, the <u>Overcoming Life Series</u>, is made up of nine books and workbooks taken from our first published book, <u>How To</u> <u>Overcome Through the Christ Unlimited</u>. That book, given to us under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, covers most of the basic things a Christian needs to know to get started on a victorious, overcoming walk with the Lord.

We have purposely kept this course simple for the average Christian who needs help in understanding how to study the Word and how to sort out principles and concepts when he, or she, reads the Bible; however, it also is for the seminary student. In addition, it is designed for students who desire to use it as a correspondence course. They can learn from it, even if they are totally alone and without a human teacher. The Holy Spirit always is there to teach us as we study about His Word.

On the other hand, groups with a teacher, or moderator, also can use this course to advantage. Our prayer is that however this course is taken, each student will complete it a different person and be conformed more into the image of Christ our Lord.

<u>The True God Workbook</u> "God's Nature and Character"

<u>The True God Workbook</u> "God's Nature and Character" Expository Introduction

[Author's Note: This workbook in the <u>Overcoming Life Series</u> is based on the book <u>The True God</u>. There are nine books and workbooks in this series. Lessons have supplementary material in addition to the books. The answers are provided at the end of the workbook and do not have to be the exact wording in many cases. The student simply needs to make sure that he has caught the concept or principle from the Word of God.]

This course is designed to help Christians study the Word of God, and while so doing, find out how to live a victorious Christian life. Simply becoming a Christian unfortunately does not guarantee that a person will live a victorious life. Through these teachings, lessons, outlines, and quizzes, we are trying to show students the principles that will make the difference between being defeated Christians or Christians victorious in Christ.

In this workbook, we are going to look at the nature and character of God. If a Christian really does not know the true nature of God and who He is, he will not know the reality of Jesus and cannot try to live as Jesus did while here on earth.

Even within the ranks of those truly born again, the way people view God will vary, because each person has been exposed to a different "picture" of God. Many times, our ideas of God are based on things we have learned or decided about the main male authority figures in our lives as children. If a person's father was permissive, he may see God that way.

If his father was an abuser, he may tend to see God as harsh, unloving, and judgmental.

Descriptions of God will vary according to:

- 1. The knowledge a person has of God personally
- 2. The knowledge a person has of His Word
- 3. The knowledge a person has of God based on what others have told that person about Him
- 4. The experiences a person has had with those in authority and with those who present themselves as servants of God

Christians are reflections of God's nature and character through their own lifestyles when they are obeying God. Many times, however, the life of a Christian does not give the world a true picture of the heavenly Father but gives Him a "bad name" because Christians do not always obey God and walk by His principles.

Obviously, our experiences do not really tell us what God is like and should not be used as a basis on which to form our opinions of God. Yet, many times, these things are what mold the way people think of God. The fact is that our experiences are not the truth by which God is to be measured. The truth about God is found in His Word, and our experiences should be measured by the Bible.

As Christians mature, our understanding and knowledge of God changes. God Himself never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Mal. 3:6; Heb. 13:8). However, the "picture" or understanding that each Christian has of the Father <u>should</u> become clearer and more accurate as each person matures spiritually. God does not change; so we are the ones who must change.

But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord.

2 Corinthians 3:18

As we change through knowing God better, the things we used to believe change. Once we really know God, no one will be able to tell us false things about Him and have us believe them.

The <u>first</u> discovery we need to make about God is this:

There is only one God and only one way to Heaven, although God is represented in three personalities: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

More and more in this century, people either say there is no God or they say there are many ways to get to Him; these are based on man's traditions, or works. Neither of these alternatives are found in the Bible; the only written source we have for information about God. Proverbs 16:25 says:

There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death.

Some of the wrong ideas (the "ways that seem right") that people have about God include the following ideas that God is:

*A "force" that set everything in motion, but is not a personality.

*Nature itself. In other words, "God" is in everything alike — the planet, flowers, trees, birds, animals, and man.

The truth is that these things are <u>not</u> God, but His creations. Called <u>pantheism</u>, this philosophy, theory, or idea evolves into the worship of nature. They were doing that in ancient times, as Paul writes in Romans 1.

Some present-day ecologists have embraced this theology, and they have elevated God's creatures and His creation above man's needs.

Certainly God is interested in caring for His creation. This fact was demonstrated in the saving of all animal flesh by placing them in the ark with Noah when the earth was destroyed by the flood of waters due to man's sin.

God is concerned about preserving our planet and its animals, as well as its environment. But most of the ecology groups are going about "saving the earth" in the wrong manner.

First, we must see what the problem truly is that is causing the destruction of our earth and its inhabitants. That <u>problem</u> is sin.

Animals and the environment are being abused because of man's greed, wastefulness, selfishness, and abusiveness. Men's hearts must be changed to correct the problem.

Changing only the circumstances related to the problem can create other problems. An example is rescuing a few animals, while eliminating the jobs of many people.

As Christians, we are commanded to have dominion over the earth and animal kingdom. If we exercise dominion properly, according to God's Word and by His nature, the animals and our environment will be cared for by His love and instruction.

And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth.

Genesis 1:28

Proverbs 12:10 says:

A righteous man regardeth the life of his beast; but the tender mercies of the wicked are cruel.

Many environmentalists have elevated the animal kingdom to be equal with mankind, which is not right. Animals are not spiritual beings, having only souls and bodies. God's crowning creation was man, who was created in His image (Gen. 1:26).

Other Misconceptions About God

Other ways people see God are as:

*A gray-haired and gray-bearded old man sitting on a throne watching and waiting to hit us over the head when we make mistakes.

*A tyrant who is the cause of all catastrophes, sicknesses, poverty, and other terrible things in our lives. He is trying to "teach us a lesson," these people say. Actually, they have the character of God mixed up with the nature of the devil! God only allows things to happen when His grace and mercy have been trampled on past the point when He can withhold judgment and be just. The Bible reveals that the way to see God is through Jesus (John 14:6). God came to earth in the physical form of Jesus (John 6:46-51). Jesus was all-God, and yet all-man; a mystery we will not be able to truly understand until we reach Heaven. The largest amount of information concerning the life of Jesus on earth is found in the gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. In the reports we are given by those first-hand witnesses of His life, we will never find that He did any wicked thing, that He ever turned away any who came to Him for healing, or that He did anything of His own will. Everything He did was what He saw the Father do (John 5:19).

Even then, the Christian had to "see" Jesus with spiritual eyes. Many of those who saw Him literally in the flesh when He was on earth did not receive Him, because He did not fit the traditions they had developed about Messiah. They looked at Him with eyes of flesh, not spiritual eyes. Good examples of seeing in the spirit are Simeon and Anna, the only two people we are told about in the Bible who recognized Jesus solely through witnesses in their spirits when He was a baby (Luke 2:25-38). The shepherds at His birth were told by angels, and the wise men followed the sign of a star. However, Simeon and Anna were given no signs or no visions of angels. They <u>knew</u> Him in their spirits.

So we can see that the best way to see God is through Jesus, after we receive Him in our hearts. Then we are to grow in Him in order to become like Him. We not only are "born again" with a new Father, but within us is the potential to become like His first-born Son, Jesus. The most important factor after being reborn is to keep the right heart attitude before the Father. To facilitate this and grow

in God, we must daily: 1) pray, 2) study God's Word, and 3) fellowship with like believers.

Some things that will hinder our seeing Jesus are: being disobedient, being rebellious (unsubmissive and unyielding), having wrong attitudes toward others and wrong ideas about God, and spending too much time with unbelievers. Too much time spent with those not in the faith, or even with Christians who have doubt and unbelief, can cause us to lose our own faith in God.

If our ideas about God are wrong, we will have difficulty obeying Him and fellowshipping with Him. Our understanding of four main concepts in life will cause us to walk in a victorious Christian life or a defeated one. Those four things are our <u>concepts of God</u>, <u>of</u> <u>Satan</u>, <u>of ourselves</u>, <u>and of others</u>. False ideas in any of these areas will hinder us from living a victorious life.

Obviously, our concepts of God are important, but it may not be as clear why it also is necessary to understand some things about the devil. We need to know that when God created Lucifer, he was beautiful and perfect until pride, self-will, and rebellion were found in him (Ezk. 28:12-19). Apparently the most beautiful being God had created, Lucifer brought war to Heaven and was cast out with a third of the angels (Rev. 12:3,4). He became the one responsible for all of the evil in the world — <u>not God</u> (Isa. 14:12-17)!

When God placed Adam and Eve on the earth, Satan had no power over either of them. Only when they disobeyed God's specific commandment (Gen. 2:16,17) did Satan become their master. Sin entered the world. When we disobey and rebel, we are in agreement with the enemy. Many times, we do not see the sin in our lives that is allowing the devil to master us. <u>Sin</u> is missing the mark of being like God.

There are several false concepts that people believe about the devil. These include:

- 1. That he is a mythological character
- 2. That he has no power over Christians (Actually, he has no <u>authority</u>, but he has all the power we allow him to have.)
- 3. That he is <u>more</u> powerful than he is, which leads to fearing him instead of God

It is necessary to have spiritual revelation in three important areas to be victorious. We need to know:

*<u>Who</u> God is (His nature and character)

*<u>Who</u> we are without Him

*<u>Who</u> we are in Him, or rather, who He is in us.

Looking at the first revelation of knowing God, we must examine the character or nature of God to be able to understand Him and how He operates.

Only Divine Love Is Complete Love

The major descriptive attribute, or characteristic, of God in Scripture is His <u>love</u> (1 John 4:7,8; Matt. 22:36-40; John 14:15, 15:9-12). God's whole nature and character is generally summed up in this one encompassing character description — love! The Apostle Paul wrote that <u>nothing</u> can separate us from the love of God (Rom. 8:38,39).

The word <u>love</u> in our society as used today is not at all the meaning of God's love. Let's look at the different meanings of this word <u>love</u> as used in the New Testament.

Four Greek words are translated as <u>love</u> in English, but only three of them are used in Scripture.¹ They are:

Agapao or agape, "divine love" or "love of God."

<u>Phileo</u>, strong tender affection, which is used for friendships or relationships.

<u>Philadelphia</u>, which is brotherly love or family love, and combines <u>phileo</u> (to love) with <u>adelphos</u> (brotherly love).

<u>Eros</u>, which means sexual love, and from which we get the English word such as "erotic."

Nothing in the New Testament deals with "erotic" love.

<u>Agape</u> is the kind of love Christians need to walk in to be victorious and only God can provide this kind of love for His followers.²

God's love is a supernatural love, because it is a sacrificial love which demands that we love our enemies and even do good to them that hate us (Matt. 5:44). Only God's <u>agape</u> love is sufficient for this task.

Isaiah 9:6 says:

For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. This scripture is descriptive of the many other facets of God's nature and different attributes which include:³

*<u>Mercy</u> (Ps. 136; Heb. 4:15-16) — God stooped down to man's level through Jesus, so He understands our plight (Heb. 4:15-16).

For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

God's mercy endures forever (Ps. 136). Mercy is the disposition to pardon a crime that deserves punishment. We all deserve Hell. Instead, through God's mercy, we receive Heaven if we accept Jesus, the only Way to salvation (John 10:9). Matthew 5:7 says that the <u>merciful</u> are blessed and will receive mercy. We can store up mercy for our time of need by being merciful to others who are fallen.

*<u>Goodness</u> (Isa. 9:6; Ps.31:19; John 14:14; Acts 10:38; James 1:17) — a reflection of Jesus being a wonderful person. Isaiah 9:6 said that Jesus' name "would be called <u>Wonderful</u>." A name reveals something about a person or a thing. When we say a person has "a good name," we are saying his name represents his character. Jesus has given us His name, which represents His character and the character of God. We can use His name by His permission. His character stands behind His name.

If ye shall ask any thing in my name, I will do it. John 14:14

*<u>Wisdom</u> (1 Cor. 1:30; Eph. 1:17) — God's love directed by knowledge. Wisdom consists of the choice of the best and most valuable end and of the most appropriate means of obtaining that end. If we lack wisdom, we are to ask for it.

The Lord by wisdom hath founded the earth; by understanding hath he established the heavens.

Proverbs 3:19

O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! how unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!

Romans 11:33

If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that given to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him.

James 1:5

Who is a wise man and endued with knowledge among you? let him shew out of a good conversation his works with meekness of wisdom. But if ye have bitter envying and strife in your hearts, glory not, and lie not against the truth. This wisdom descendeth not from above, but is earthly, sensual, devilish. For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy.

James 3:13-17

God, being all wise, has the solutions to all of our problems, and we have access to that wisdom because we are His children.

*Power — God's power is noted by the term "the mighty God" in Isaiah 9:6. The evidence of God's Being is portrayed by His power. This power, of course, is always directed toward man's highest good. It also is associated with doing the works of God (Matt. 28:18-20; Acts 1:8, 6:8; Heb. 13:8). We know that God is all-powerful.

Three terms are used in theology to describe God's power. He is <u>omnipotent</u>, which means unlimited power and authority (Matt. **28:18-20**); <u>omniscient</u>, which means that God knows all things, and there is nothing we can hide from Him; and <u>omnipresent</u>, which means God is everywhere, in all places at the same time. (We cannot really understand any of these concepts; however, we must have the revelation that they are true of God in order to live a victorious life.) The power of God is mighty and limitless! He is the <u>Christ Unlimited</u>.

*<u>Faith</u> — Hebrews 11:3 tells us that through faith we understand the worlds were framed by the Word of God. God not only is <u>Faith</u> Himself, He is faithful. We, as His children, must express that faith and faithfulness also. Faith is such an important characteristic of

God that it is spoken of in scripture as a fruit, a gift, and also, as part of the spiritual armor of believers.

*<u>Compassion</u> — the Greek word <u>oikteiro</u> is used in Romans 9:15, when Paul wrote of God's compassion.

For he saith to Moses, I will have mercy on whom I will have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I will have compassion.

That word <u>oikteiro</u> means not only to have pity on someone but "to feel distress through the ills of others."⁴

Notice that in the same verse, Paul made a distinction between <u>mercy</u> and <u>compassion</u>. Mercy usually is extended when compassion is felt. In the Old Testament, David also made a distinction between <u>mercy</u> and <u>compassion</u>, as in Psalm 86:15.

But thou, O Lord, art a God full of <u>compassion</u>, and gracious, longsuffering, and plenteous in <u>mercy</u> and truth.

When the writers of the gospels wrote of Jesus being "moved with compassion" toward those suffering with sicknesses and demon possession, they used a different word: <u>splanchnizomai</u>, which means "to be moved so strongly that one's 'inward parts' (bowels) are affected by pity." Still a third word, <u>sumpatheo</u>, means "to suffer <u>with</u> another," which is a still stronger concept used of Christ as our High Priest in Hebrews 4:15.

Today, Christ literally "suffers" with us in our trials.

Additional Characteristics of God

Other characteristics of God include:

*<u>Truth</u> (John 14:6) — not only in the sense of not being able to lie (John 3:33), but in the sense of being absolute reality.

There is nothing in Him, about Him, or that He says or does that is not absolutely accurate and real.

*Justice — when used about God, justice means "the perfect agreement between His nature and His acts, in which He is the standard for all men," according to <u>Vine's Dictionary</u>.⁵

Moses wrote about God's justice in Numbers:

God is not a man, that he should lie; neither the son of man, that he should repent: hath he said, and shall he not do it? or hath he spoken, and shall he not make it good?

Numbers 23:19

Abraham first spoke forth faith in the justice of God when He was interceding for the people of Sodom and Gomorrah.

That be far from thee to do after this manner, to slay the righteous with the wicked: and that the righteous should be as

the wicked, that be far from thee: Shall not the Judge of all the earth do right?

Genesis 18:25

He is the Rock, his work is perfect: for all his ways are judgment: a God of truth and without iniquity, just and right is he. Deuteronomy 32:4

*<u>Severity</u> — which is not usually one of the characteristics people consider "good" in today's permissive society. However, God's severity is upon sin and sinners who do not repent and is mentioned in the same verse as His <u>goodness</u> in Romans 11:21,22.

For if God spared not the natural branches, take heed lest he also spare not thee. Behold therefore the <u>goodness</u> and <u>severity</u> of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also shalt be cut off.

*<u>Patience</u> — a very important characteristic for us to develop in order to live victoriously in Christ.

Now the God of patience and consolation grant you to be likeminded one toward another according to Christ Jesus.

Romans 15:5

Vine wrote:

"Patience perfects Christian character, James 1:4, and fellowship in the patience of Christ is therefore the condition upon which believers are to be admitted to reign with Him, 2 Tim. 2:12; Rev. 1:9. For this patience, believers are 'strengthened with all power,' Col. 1:11, 'through His Spirit in the inward man,' Eph. 3:16."⁶

*<u>Orderliness</u> — God is not the author of confusion, as the Apostle Paul wrote.

For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all churches of the saints.

1 Corinthians 14:33

*<u>Simplicity</u> — another aspect not usually associated with God, who is more complex than anything He has created. However, in His dealings with man, His simplicity is manifested, not His complexity. Paul feared that the Corinthians' minds would be "corrupted" from the simplicity that is in Christ.

But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtility, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ.

2 Corinthians 11:3

*<u>Meekness, or humility</u> — something Jesus said of Himself. He said that He was "meek" (teachable) and "lowly" (humble) in heart (Matt. 11:29,30).

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Also, the <u>fruits of the Spirit</u> (Gal. 5:22,23) are manifested in the Holy Spirit as characteristics of God. With the revelation of <u>Who God</u> <u>is</u>, we still need to have a revelation of <u>who we are</u>.

Concerning ourselves, we need to know that we are important to God. However, without Him, we can do nothing. We need to know He has a purpose for each of our lives and that He wants us to have esteem for ourselves <u>because of who we are in Him</u>, which is the third revelation we need.

When we see who we are without Christ, we see an ugly picture. We see hatred, meanness, murder, greed, selfishness, self-centeredness, and all of the other things the Apostle Paul listed as part of "the old man" or the "old nature," the part of man inherited from Adam (Eph. 4:22-32, 5:3-5).

The Bible says the righteousness of men without God is "as filthy rags" (Isa. 64:6). Titus 3:5,6 points out also that it is not because of any works we have done that we are saved, but only through the mercy of God. Not one person is righteous without God (Rom. 3:10). Salvation is a gift that cannot be earned.

Some people get a revelation of <u>self</u> without Christ, and it is so depressing, they commit suicide. We, as Christians, need to know who we are without Christ; but more important is who we are in <u>Christ</u>, or rather Christ in us. In Christ, we are everything He is. All we must do is receive it. The characteristics of Christ are in us through the Holy Spirit; however, just as with salvation, we must appropriate them.

Also, we need to see worth in others. We need to look at fellow Christians as children of God and grant them the same mercy He has granted us (Matt. 18:21-35). The faults and failures we see in others are the work of Satan, the enemy of all mankind, just as the faults and failures we find in our own selves.

To walk in victory, we need the revelation that through Christ we are overcomers of all things. Revelation 21:7 says that the overcomers shall inherit all things. Ephesians 3:16-21 tells us that we are to be filled with the <u>fullness of God</u>. So we see that becoming saved makes us potential overcomers, but not all who are born again learn to walk in the power and victory available to them.

The goal of all Christians, as established by God, is to be conformed to the image of Christ (Rom. 8:29). To that end, God set apostles, prophets, evangelists, teachers, and pastors in the Body of Christ (the Church) to bring us into the "measure of the fullness of Christ" (Eph. 4:11-13).

We have only one example in order to be like our Father, and that is Jesus Christ!

That gives us some idea of <u>who</u> God is. Who we are is a more difficult revelation to get, as we become bankrupt and hopeless without Christ (Rom. 6:23) so we cannot see ourselves clearly. The Bible truth is that who we are in Him is <u>everything</u> that He is. We receive His love, His gifts, and His power to overcome everything (1 John 4:4; John 1:12). We do not become <u>divine</u> as God is divine, but through Christ, we partake of the "divine nature." We do not

become as God, but we can become like Him (made in His image).

Two scriptural tests to determine whether we are living the Godkind of love (<u>agape</u>) are these:

Do we love God first and our neighbors as ourselves (Matt. 22:36-40)? In other words do we truly love one another (John 15:9-12)?

Are we keeping God's commandments?

Are we truly obedient?

The Bible says that if we <u>truly</u> love the Father, we will obey Him (John 14:15).

salvation (Acts 3:19,20; Rom. 4:1-5, 5:1; Eph. 2:8-10).

Body of Christ: We believe the Body of Christ is made up of all who have been born again regardless of denominational differences. We believe in the spirit of unity, while allowing for variety in individual ministries as to their work, calling, and location as directed by the Holy Spirit (Acts 10:34,35; 1 Cor. 12:12-31).

<u>Blood Atonement:</u> We believe in the saving power of the blood of Jesus and His imputed righteousness (Acts 4:12; Rom. 4:1-9, 5:1-11; Eph. 1:3-14).

<u>Bodily Resurrection:</u> We believe in the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ (Luke 24:39-43; John 20:24-29).

<u>Ascension:</u> We believe that Christ Jesus ascended to the Father and is presently engaged in building a place for us in Heaven and interceding for the saints (John 14:2,3; Rom. 8:34).

<u>Second Coming:</u> We believe in the visible, bodily return of Christ Jesus to this earth, to meet His Church (Bride) and to judge the world (Acts 1:10,11; 1 Thess. 4:13-18; 2 Thess. 1:7-10; James 5:8; Rev. 1:7).

<u>Ordinances:</u> We believe that the two ordinances of the Body of Christ are water baptism and the Lord's Supper (Matt. 28:19; 1 Cor. 11:24-26).

<u>Heaven and Hell:</u> We believe Scripture clearly sets forth the doctrines of eternal punishment for the lost and eternal bliss and service for the saved — a literal hell for the unsaved and heaven for the saved (Matt. 25:34,41,46; Luke 16:19-31; John 14:1-3; Rev. 20:11-15).

Holy Spirit: We believe the Holy Spirit to be the third person of the Trinity whose purpose in the redemption of man is to convict of sin, regenerate the repentant believer, guide the believer into all truth, indwell all believers, and give gifts to those He wills that they may minister as Christ would to men. We believe that the manifestations of the Holy Spirit recorded in 1 Corinthians 12:8-11 will operate through present-day Christians who yield to Jesus (Luke 11:13; John 7:37-39, 14:16,17, 16:7-14; Acts 2:1-18).

We believe the baptism in the Holy Spirit, with the evidence of speaking in other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance, is for all believers as promised by John the Baptist (Matt. 3:11), Jesus (Acts 1:4-8), and Peter (Acts 2:38-41). The fulfillment of this promise was witnessed by early disciples of Christ (Acts 2:4, 10:44-47, 19:1-6) and operates in many present-day disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ.

<u>Divine Healing</u>: We believe God has used doctors, medicines, and other natural means of healing; however, we believe divine healing is provided for believers in the atonement made by Jesus' blood shed on the cross (Isa. 53:5; 1 Pet. 2:24). We believe divine healing may be appropriated by the laying on of hands by the elders (James 5:14-16), by the prayer of an anointed person gifted by the Holy Spirit for healing the sick (1 Cor. 12:9), or by a direct act of receiving this provision by faith (Mark 11:23,24).
